The annual Lions Club District 50 Convention was held May 1–3 at the Hibiscus Ballroom in the Ala Moana Hotel. The District 50 Cabinet meeting convened, followed by a special presentation from the Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF) and a ceremony honoring those who donated \$1,000 or more to the Melvin Jones Fellowship.


The evening began with a performance by the Royal Hawaiian Band, whose dignified presence helped set a respectful tone for the night. Their music served as a fitting prelude to the evening's main event—the





traditional Flag Ceremony, a highlight that honored the values and unity of Lions Club members across the district.

The second day took on a more reflective tone with presentations by the Resolution Committee and the Hawaii Lions







The afternoon included a hands-on service project involving Genki Balls, a District 50 environmental initiative. Genki balls are tennis ball-sized mud balls. Each one contains a mixture of bran, clay, water, soil, rice, molasses, and EM•1 solution. For the project, is a broad community effort involving over 100 partners from various sectors, and District 50 Hawaii Lions Club are one of the organizations that tosses Genki balls into the Ala Wai canal to digest sludge.



On the final day, attendees gathered for the solemn Necrology Ceremony honoring departed members. This was followed by a presentation from the Constitution and By-Laws Committee, candidate nominations and speeches, and elections for the new fiscal year's top key leadership for 2nd & 1st Vice District Governor, and DG. The district contest & awards luncheon celebrated the achievements of the past year.

The convention concluded with the prestigious District Governor's Banquet. Dr. Lori Inouye-Yamashita, District Governor 2024-2025, presented the top leadership awards to PDG Garrett Ogawa

She also led food distribution programs and coordinated disaster relief efforts, including the delivery of over 200 pallets of supplies for survivors of the Maui wildfires.

## A Successful D50 Statewide Food Drive

OW, another awesome effort by the Lions at the D50 Statewide Stamp Out Hunger Day Food Drive!

This food drive was held on the State's four most populous islands. The monetary and food donations reflect the generosity of the public. There were 92 Lions, 25 Leos, Ms. Kimberly Kaya, and 10 HOSA (Future Health Professionals known as Health Occupations Students of America) members from Maui High School participating in this statewide project. Collectively, we received over \$4,000 in monetary donations and 1,800 pounds of canned goods and non-perishable foods. The collections were distributed to food banks and pantries on their respective islands. We also collected \$400 in monetary donations through the Hawai'i Foodbank virtual donation page.

There were Leos from Moanalua High School and Kaiser High School who lined up alongside Lions on Punchbowl and South Beretania Streets to collect monetary donations. We had fun getting our hands dirty and getting to know other volunteers. We shall continue to volunteer and help them reach the goal of deploying **300,000** genki balls!

# **Kauluwela Green Thumb Vegetable Garden** was launched by

the Honolulu Chinatown Lions with *much kokua* from other Lions and Leos.

First thing first, during the months of August to November 2024, we built the storage shed and assembled 20 raised garden boxes, dug a shallow trench for the water pipe and installed the irrigation drip hoses. With much appreciation, the **Hawaii** 

Kai Lions (Ells, Frances, and Kevin) figured out the connections between the 1,000 jigsaw pieces. Many hours later, the storage shed was up and ready to store bags of soil, garden boxes and garden tools.

Then onward to the next phase. This time, the Leos from Roosevelt, Farrington, **Sacred Hearts** and their advisors lend *a lot of kokua* with building the garden boxes, digging the trench, prepping the ground, and carrying the 50lb bags of soil to fill the garden boxes. Mahalo to Leo Advisors and Lions Steve Yoshimura, Cindy Mercado and Whitney Grohowski.





Now that the garden boxes were ready, we had set a date with the students from the Kauluwela Kulia Project and their teachers to plant the vegetable

seeds. This was in November, and the rain came! The second date was set, and the rain came! We had to cancel both days of planting with the students, but we couldn't delay getting the seeds into the soil. One afternoon

when the sun came out, the teachers and students were prepared and planted the seeds without our help.

Fast forward after months of the seeds germinating and growing, and students watering and learning about vegetables, the garden came to life--in a way! Here is a short update from the teachers: "The garden has taken some shape, however; it has been a particularly challenging season where things haven't gone as we hoped. A few plants have sprouted from the seedlings and have taken root from what we had transplanted. We realize that our garden has faced several obstacles that have affected its growth. Despite our best efforts in preparing the soil, planting from seedlings or replanting, and providing water, we have noticed that many of our plants struggled. Despite these challenges, I believe it's essential to focus on the positive aspects of our gardening experience. We have learned valuable lessons about resilience and adaptability. Together, we are exploring solutions, such as adjusting our watering schedule, and applying organic pest control methods."

# A Leo Advisor's Reflection: Three Years of Leadership, Experience, and Opportunity

s I sit here reflecting on the past year with our Hilo Crescent City Leo Club, my heart fills with an overwhelming sense of pride and gratitude. When we established this club in November 2021, I could never have imagined the incredible young leaders these youth would become or the profound impact they would have on our Hilo community.

The acronym LEO—Leadership, Experience, and Opportunity—has proven to be more than just words on paper. I have witnessed these principles come alive through the dedication and enthusiasm of our remarkable young members.

### **Leadership in Action**

Month after month, I've watched our Leos set up tables in front of KTA Super Stores for our lavosh fundraisers. What strikes me most is not just their commitment to showing up, but how naturally they've stepped into leadership roles. They organize themselves, engage with community members, and work together seamlessly to support local causes. These aren't just fundraising events—they're master classes in civic engagement and teamwork.

The food drives we organized in September 2024 and again this past May demonstrated their growing understanding of food insecurity in our community. Watching them sort donations, coordinate with local food banks, and genuinely care about ensuring no family goes hungry showed me that these young people truly grasp the weight of service.

### **Experience Beyond the Classroom**

The diversity of our activities this year has provided our Leos with experiences they simply cannot get in a traditional classroom

setting. From the joy and creativity they brought to the KTA Halloween Haunted House to the tenderness they showed while organizing diapers for the Hawai'i Diaper Bank, each event has been a lesson in empathy and community connection.

Their participation in the Keiki Christmas Toy Drive through the Laulima Program was particularly moving. To see teenagers sacrifice their own Saturday mornings to ensure that children in our community would have gifts under the tree exemplifies the spirit of aloha that runs deep in these young hearts.

The Lions in Sight program, where we collected recycled eyeglasses, may have seemed like a simple task, but I observed our Leos asking thoughtful questions about global health disparities and the impact of vision care accessibility. These moments remind me that service opens minds and broadens perspectives in ways that textbooks cannot.

#### **Opportunity to Grow and Give**

Perhaps the most humbling experience was helping with parking at the Annual Merrie Monarch Festival. Here, our Leos were part of something larger than themselves, supporting one of Hawai'i's most cherished cultural celebrations. They approached this responsibility with the respect and reverence it deserved, understanding that they were contributing to the preservation and sharing of Hawaiian culture.

Our third anniversary celebration at White Guava Cafe was bittersweet in the best possible way. As I looked around the table at these young faces, I realized I wasn't just seeing the club members they are today, but

Melvin Jones Fellowship (MJF) is not an award; rather, it is a recognition given to humanitarians who have donated \$1,000. LCIF tracks all donations, no matter the amount and when it reaches \$1,000 Lions can apply for an MJF or Progressive Melvin Jones Fellowship (PMJF). When you donate to LCIF, please identify your name and Lions ID number.

As the D50 LCIF Coordinator, I receive a monthly report of Lions and their donations to date. When it reaches \$1,000, I will alert you that you can now apply for (P)MJF; it is not automatic. After the \$1,000 credits are used for the (P)MJF, the report reverts to \$0 and builds the next time you donate. Let me know if you want to know what your current balance is. Several Lions asked, donated the balance to reach \$1,000, and applied for their next (P)MJF in time for the 2025 D50 Convention.

At the 2025 D50 Convention, we held a special LCIF event. Our international guest was Immediate Past International President (IPIP) Dr Patti Hill. She is the current LCIF Chairperson and pinned several D50 Lions like Lion Renee Ako (**Koko Head**) and Lion David Iwana (**Hawaii Kai**) (see photos below).
