

# HLF establishes the District 50 Hawaii Lions Hall of Fame



At it's meeting on August 2, the Hawaii Lions Foundation (HLF) Board of Trustees approved the establishment and incorporation of the District 50 Hawaii Lions Hall of Fame (HoF). In discussions held with District leaders, it was felt that the Foundation would be the appropriate venue to provide a stable and permanent home for the District 50 Hall of Fame.

Alongside, and in keeping with its Hawaii Lions Foundation Fellowships (HLFF), the HoF would recognize and honor those Lions who have had a profound and lasting impact on our District. It would allow us the opportunity to acknowledge those Lions who have distinguished themselves significantly through their commitment, dedication and service, to fulfill the mission and motto of our Association —"WE SERVE".

The Foundation diligently reviewed and analyzed numerous Lions Halls of Fame across the country, and has established a meaningful and clear nomination and selection process. Our process is unique in that it is both quantitative and qualitative, the nominee must first meet the minimum numerical criteria to qualify. Upon qualification, the candidate will be evaluated upon their record of service and impact on the District. The Foundation carefully crafted the criteria and created the process and format for the nomination process.

To recognize and honor those individuals long after their active years of service or after their deaths, consideration has also been made for their inclusion into the HoF, on a historical or posthumous basis. A waiver on the minimum score needed to qualify may be granted, with greater emphasis placed on the supporting information and letter of support for consideration. The nominee must have been inactive or deceased for five (5) or more years to qualify for this category of inclusion. Please refer to the nomination form for additional information on these retrospective submissions.

The Foundation will automatically enroll the HLFF honorees – PID Shizuo Onishi, PID Herbert Watanabe, PDG Tokuo Tani and PDG Norman Sakata, for inclusion into the D-50 Hall of Fame. In celebration of our Century of Service, we would like to induct the initial class of honorees at the upcoming District Convention in Hilo in April of 2026. Thus, the **nominations** for the HoF this year **must be received by HLF no later than January 22, 2026** for consideration, no exceptions will be made. The HoF nomination form can be obtained on both the Hawaii Lions and Hawaii Lions Foundation websites.

We hereby ask you and your club to consider nominating a worthy candidate from your club, Zone or District for inclusion into the D-50 Hawaii Lions Hall of Fame.

Repeat: Nominations must be received by HLF no later than January 22, 2026.

# **Documenting Leo Data into the Lion Portal**

The Lion Portal serves as a vital platform for inputting data which is reported to Lions Club International. All members have access to information in the Lion Portal. Personal information is accessible by the individual. Other data is restricted by the member's officer position being held.

#### **Responsibilities of the Sponsoring Club**

I would like to address documenting Leo data into the the Lion Portal. The sponsoring club is responsible to assign a Leo Advisor. Should the Leo club be a school-based club, a faculty advisor needs to be a faculty member of that school. However the Leo Advisor doesn't have to be a faculty member but needs to be a sponsoring club member.

#### **Role of Leo Club Advisors**

Leo club advisors are Lions who enjoy working with young people. Their primary responsibilities include

- · Guiding Leos in managing club activities.
- Assisting in the development of effective community service projects.
- Fostering leadership development by creating a supportive learning environment and connecting Leos with community leaders.

#### **Inputting Leo Advisor Assignments**

Once a Leo Advisor is assigned by the sponsoring Lion club, this information should be documented into the Lion Portal. The Leo Advisor is also responsible for ensuring that the Leo club data remains current in the Lion Portal. This includes:

- Inputting the names of Leo members
- Designating Leo club officers.

The Leo Advisor, the Leo club president and secretary have access to input this data.

#### **Training Assistance**

To assist Lions and Leos in navigating the Lion Portal and managing data input effectively, I am providing training sessions. These sessions can be conducted via:

- Email
- Texting
- Voice assistance

# **Leo Club Advisor Training**

To strengthen the relationship between a sponsoring Lions Club and the Leo Club, a Leo advisor needs to be assigned. It is essential for the Leo Club to be familiar with the Lions Club, and this can be achieved by having the Leo Advisor attend Leo Club meetings. Additionally, we encourage a Lions Club officer to also attend these meetings.

Training material is provided for the Leo Advisor. At the bottom of each module, you will see the word "PowerPoint." Please select it to access the training module PowerPoint.

Once the Leo advisor is assigned, it is crucial for the club to input this information into the Lion Portal. If you require assistance with registering, navigating, or inputting data into the Lion Portal, please do not hesitate to contact PDG Eric Nordmeier to schedule a training session.

The Leo Club Advisor Training is designed to provide Leo club advisors with a clearer understanding of the Leo Club Program and their role as an advisor. The training includes six modules that cover important tools and resources to help Leo club advisors serve effectively and confidently. District and multiple district Leo chairs can use these resources to train advisors as a group, or advisors can review the content independently. The modules may be used together or individually, based on the needs of the trainer or advisor.

#### **Module 1: Leo Club Program Overview**

This module introduces participants to the history, rationale and structure of the Leo Club Program.

# Operation Christmas Child – Packing Hope, One Shoebox at a Time!!

Samaritan's Purse is a nonprofit run by Franklin Graham, Billy Graham's son. The program Operation Christmas Child falls under this organization. They send shoeboxes for kids to 3<sup>rd</sup> world countries. These kids have very little to nothing, and it is probably the only gift that they will get. The local group has been doing this for around 10 years and pack 10,000 shoeboxes per year. They pack from June to November.

Guy Hashimoto and Kathy Higa from **Kina'ole Lions Club** have volunteered for this project for the past 3 years. Recently on a Friday morning, we packed 1,000 shoeboxes for girls ages 2-4 and 10-14 (Boxes for girls 5-9 were packed the following day, and the boys' boxes will be packed in the coming month.) We were delighted to be joined by Tiara Baruela from the **Healthy Cyber Leo-Lion Club** and PDG Garrett Ogawa from the **Manoa Lions Club**. Every shoebox was carefully filled with treasures like school supplies, hygiene items, small toys, t-shirts, stuffed animals, calendars, balls, toothbrushes, combs, brushes, fabric, yarn, bandaids, new cups, slippers etc.

When you imagine a child's face lighting up as they open their very first gift, you realize how powerful this project is. It's more than just items in a box-it's a message of love, dignity, and kindness that crosses oceans.

Things that we take for granted are treasures in under developed countries.

All the items that are placed in the shoeboxes are donated. They ask for new items, but they will wash gently used stuffed animals and tennis balls. They also ask for flatware-stainless steel forks/spoons etc. as plastic does not hold up and these counties do not have landfills for trash. The complete list is on Samaritan's purse website under Christmas Child.

Other items not on the website include – fabric, yarn, sewing notions, embroidery threads, craft items, beads, buttons, trims, ribbons.

Items that are not allowed are food, soap, liquids, toy weapons, or vitamins.
