District Governor's Message

Aloha Hawai'i Lions,

I had the blessing of joining over 3,000 Lions from across the United States and Canada at the USA/Canada Forum in Atlantic City, New Jersey. Imagine that—thousands of Lions leaders, gathered together with one purpose: to learn, to grow, and to discover new ways we can serve and make a difference in our world. The energy in that room was electric, filled with people who truly care about service, about leadership, and about living the Lions motto—"We Serve."

As I sat there, my thoughts drifted back home to Hawaii. Here in District 50, we are a family of about 1,500 Lions spread across our islands. 





During my stay, PID Maurice shared his life story. His father was Hawaiian from Kahuku and his mother was 2nd generation Japanese from Waipahu. PID Maurice learned discipline from his dad and learned to cook from his mom.

Maurice worked for Chevron and in 1980 became the operations manager of all neighbor islands. His leadership style was to encourage his employees to be honest. He asked his employees to admit their mistakes and never do it again.

In 1986, Maurice joined the Waiakea Lions Club. His sponsor Lion Mits Sumida was the provost at the local community college. Lion Mits was so thankful that Maurice started a scholarship for a single parent student.

Later PDG Norman Sakata invited Lion Maurice to transfer to the Lions Club of Kona. PDG Norman Sakata and Lion Henry Cho encouraged Lion Maurice to run for District Governor in 2003. PDG Maurice

later became an International Director (ID). ID Maurice lamented some IDs appeared "untouchable" and was proud that he would greet every Lion at events. PID Maurice (aka Silver Fox for his silver hair) will forever be remembered for his aloha.

love you." We both cried.

That's the memory I will carry with me forever. Meke aloha pumehana, PID Maurice.

Mental Health & Well-Being Service Ideas


- Reach out to club members or close friends who you haven't seen for a while! Make sure your loved ones are all right by calling them via phone or sending a warm handwritten card.
- Donate food, toiletries or maintenance services to a local transitional living home serving disabled individuals and/or those living with various mental health conditions in your community.
- Coordinate a card writing drive in your club to high-risk / burnout communities in your area. This can include gratitude cards with well-being resources sent to healthcare workers, educators, social workers, first responders, nonprofit professionals, policy leaders, etc. Opportunities here are endless!
- Host crafting, lei making, card making or other creative workshops to promote healing through arts.
- Share mindfulness or wellness kits to students, caregivers or anyone you feel needs a sense of wellness! These kits can include stress balls, small scented lotions or soaps, puzzles, or well-being resources.
- Take a walk outside! There will be a walk on Oahu held Saturday, October 22, 2025 hosted by the National Alliance on Mental Illness (NAMI). Consider learning more and participating!

Introduction

Mahalo to everyone who participated in the District 50 May 2025 Survey. We received 50 responses, including one from a Lion from another district. Your feedback provides valuable insight into our strengths and the areas where we can grow together. Below are the highlights of the survey, which reflect the voices of Lions across our district.

Mission

- Most respondents rated themselves at 3 (22 responses) on familiarity with the district's mission, showing moderate awareness.
- About 12 members felt "very familiar."
- Effectiveness in achieving the mission was largely rated 3–4 (42 combined responses), with only a few saying "not effective."
- Suggestions included better training, clearer communication of achievements, and stronger recruitment/retention efforts.

Communication

- Most members rated district communications as effective (4: 18 responses, 5: 12 responses).
- Preferred method: overwhelmingly Email (45 responses).
- Frequency: "Whenever needed" was the top choice (33 responses).
- Improvements requested:
 - Reduce daily emails → weekly consolidated updates.
 - Encourage club officers (president/secretary) to forward messages reliably.
 - More consistency and accuracy in information shared.

Leadership

- Satisfaction with leadership opportunities leaned high: 24 responses rated 4, 13 rated 5.
- Members want:
 - In-person training at cabinet meetings and conventions.
 - o Island-specific training for broader reach.
 - Use of outside trainers for fresh perspectives.
 - Revival of past practices (e.g., leadership workshops after cabinet meetings).

Activities & Events

- Satisfaction: mostly 3–4 (42 combined responses) with 8 very satisfied.
- Spending on conventions: majority comfortable with \$250 or less.
- · Feedback:
 - o Less emphasis on karaoke or large events like Lions in the Park.
 - o More creative, youth-friendly, and environmental initiatives.

Development & Support

- Members appreciated online training and best practices sessions.
- Requests included:
 - More webinars and Zoom-based short trainings.
 - Mentoring from past leaders.
 - Small group meetings to engage quieter members.
 - Opportunities to connect personal and professional development with Lions service.

Membership

- · Key strategies suggested:
 - o Make membership recruitment a standing agenda item.
 - Use social media (TikTok, Facebook) to reach younger demographics.



Konawaena High School Leo Club & Lions Club of Kona

Young People Making A Difference

Seven years ago, the Konawaena High School Leo Club partnered with the Kona Soil and Water Conservation District (SWCD) and the Lions Club of Kona to educate the residents of Kona on the fragile environment within North and South Kona.

The project started 2 years prior when the SWCD printed a booklet highlighting deforestation, soil degradation, water quality, invasive species and improper and overuse of chemical herbicides as major resource concerns within the Kona District. In 2018, Past President Jeff Knowles and director with the Kona SWCD gave a presentation to the Leo Board who wanted to help the SWCD inform the public on our resource concerns.

The Leo Club started with mass mailings in 2018, 2019 to 350 businesses and 5000 residential properties in mid-Kona. The project continued with posters being developed and placed around the district. During the last 3 years, Leo club members made over 1,000 public service announcements that went out over 6 radio stations in Kona.

Each new Leo Board over the last 7 years has taken a different approach to getting the word out to the Kona community on actions community members can take to preserve our environment and address climate change.

When the project began 7 years ago, Leo board members recognized there were few native trees on any of the 3 Konawaena school complexes. The principals of Konawaena elementary, middle and high school were contacted and sites were selected to plant native plants on each of the campuses. Native plants were planted at the high school and middle school 3-4 years ago.

The elementary school has a 330'x60' area that was a maintenance nightmare for the school



and the Leo club has been completing planting in the area each of the last 5 years. The planting began when black landscape fabric was spread over the 1.5-acre area. Each year different native plants were planted along with maintenance to control guinea grass and keep some native plants from spreading. Konawaena Elementary School has hired an Aloha Aina teacher who is teaching young keiki about native plants. To date 50 different native species have been planted, and the goal is to get 100 different native species on display. Signs have been placed by each species.







The County of Hawaii has been an avid supporter of this project and over \$50,000 has been awarded to the Leo Club and Kona SWCD to complete these outreach efforts and plantings.

The Konawaena Leo club's efforts, combined with the partnerships, is resulting in community action being taken to address serious resource concerns within Kona. The educational benefits to our young students will bring knowledge of native plants and is expected to result in more native planting on private and public lands.

This ongoing project is an incredible example of young people making a difference in solving community problems through the structure of the Leo and Lions club. The overreaching message to community members of Kona has been, "Climate change can be solved" and residents are left with the message, "you can make a difference".



The Hawai'i Diaper Bank celebrated a remarkable outpouring of generosity during its recent Island-Wide Diaper Drive, fueled by the combined efforts of **Big Island Lions Clubs**, **Leos**, and KTA Super Stores 'Ohana. Together, volunteers and community members collected thousands of diapers, wipes, formula, and cash donations to support Hawai'i Island keiki and families in need.

By the Numbers

In a single day, the drive brought in 6,914 diapers, wipes, and essentials, with contributions from four KTA Super Stores locations:

Puainako: 1,241 diapers, 560 wipes, 2 cans of

formula

Waimea: 271 diapers, 352 wipes Waikoloa: 792 diapers, 192 wipes

Kailua-Kona: 2,391 diapers, 1,112 wipes,

hygiene products

Monetary donations added even greater impact, totaling \$1,741.07, the highest single-day cash contribution ever received by the Hawai'i Diaper Bank from a drive. Highlights included:

Puainako: \$345.63

Waimea: \$182.84 Waikoloa: \$485.25

Kailua-Kona: \$727.35

Combined, these resources will provide 8,700 diapers, enough to cover the needs of 174 keiki.

Adding to the success, Lion Geoli's Waiakea Water contributed an additional 5,000 diapers, ensuring that even more families receive vital support.



Clubs and Community Involvement

This drive was powered by the heart and service of Lions and Leos across Hawai'i Island. Participating clubs included the Hilo Crescent City Lions, Hawai'i Young Visionaries Leos, Waimea Lions, Waikoloa Lions, Lions Club of Kona, and the Konawaena Leos Club.

The event was hosted across four KTA Super Stores locations: KTA Puainako, KTA Kailua, KTA Waimea, and KTA Waikoloa — reinforcing the strong community partnership between Lions, KTA, and the Hawai'i Diaper Bank.

The event was filled with powerful keynote sessions, practical seminars, and opportunities to connect with Lions from every corner of the continent. Some of the most meaningful moments included:


- Inspirational Keynotes: Hearing from our International President reminded me that leadership is not just about position, but about service with heart.


