D50 Hawai'i Lions Strategic Plan for 2025–2026 & The Story of Lion Jhade – How Service Opens Doors

Aloha Hawai'i Lions,

Sometimes the best recruitment stories begin not with a meeting, but with a moment of service.

I first met Lion Jhade back in December 2023, while our

was working on a graffiti clean-up project along the 'Aiea Bridge. We were out there doing what Lions do best — serving — when a gentleman passed by, parked his car, and stopped to check on it. We exchanged a friendly “hello,” and thought nothing more of it.

A little while later, he passed by again, lingering nearby. I struck up a conversation and learned his name was Jhade. He mentioned that when he lived in Makakilo, his landlord had been a Lion — and right then, I could tell there was a spark of connection.

I asked if he might like to join us sometime for service, and he said yes. Soon after, President Dexter invited him to meet us for breakfast at Waimalu Shopping Center. We were just finishing our meal when Jhade walked in — and from that moment, he was part of the 'ohana.

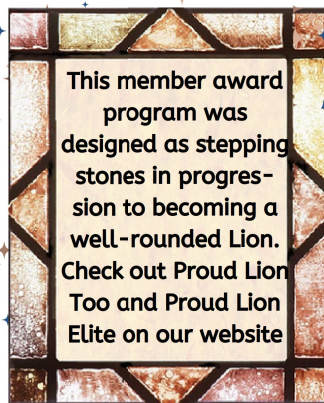

Aloha Fellow Lions,

At the 2nd Quarter Cabinet meeting held on October 25, the cabinet approved a **loan** of up to \$10,000.00 from the Unrestricted Administrative Reserve, for the Centennial Committee to continue its work on the new District Aloha Shirt.



The funds are needed at this time to:

1. Insure the timely delivery of the shirts for the Hilo District Convention in April of 2026. The production and delivery schedules needed to meet the deadline require us to place the order prior to the sale of all 300 units. Currently we have orders for a little over 200 shirts.
2. As the shirts will also serve as the official District uniform and as the cabinet shirts for at least the next two administrations [Cedric Mitsui (2026-27); Tony Tassillio (2027-28)], a minimum inventory should be held for new members and cabinet appointees. Since this will be a one-time production run, we will not have the opportunity to purchase

additional inventory at a later date. The inventory supply needs to be ordered now for future use.

Due to these considerations, the cabinet approved the use of the reserve, **as a loan**, subject of course to provisions under Article VIII, Section 2, which require the approval of the majority of clubs in the District.

The purpose of this shirt is to:

- Commemorate the centennial of our mother club, the Lions Club of Honolulu, and the century of Lions service in Hawaii!
- To finally replace the old 2015 Aloha shirt with a new and exclusive District shirt, something that many of you have been asking for!



Please note that this is a **loan**, to be repaid to the District upon further sales of the shirt. Without this funding, the fabrication of the Aloha shirt will undoubtedly be cancelled.

As noted, we need your approval for the use of the funds. We therefore ask for your support and vote when this proposal is presented at your club.

Your club's vote must be submitted to the Cabinet Secretary by no later than November 15, 2025.



Reminiscing Through the Years: D50's International Directors

It was great to read the stories, the memories of Lion Maurice in the October Leo Liona. An outpouring of aloha for a cherished member of our Lions Ohana, I'm sure each of us have fond and humorous tales to tell about the "silver fox."

PID Maurice Kahawaii

Lion Maurice was truly our Ambassador of Aloha, he and Lani always represented us with kindness and humility wherever they went. Even though I followed in his footsteps 15 years later as International Director, no matter where Pam and I traveled to, Lions would always come up and ask us about Maurice. They remembered that mane of white hair, his gentle and loving smile, and that spirit of aloha he conveyed to everyone. He warmed the lives of many Lions and will be fondly remembered and missed.

Though PID Maurice and I both started as Lions on the Big Island, he with the Waiakea Lions Club in 1986, and me with the Kailua-Kona club a few years earlier, we really didn't know each other then. I had returned to Honolulu before Maurice and Lani moved to Kona. My first recollection of the "silver fox" was attending his convention in Waikoloa in 2004. We got to know each other during his term as ID in 2007-09, and certainly during the time leading up to the 2015 International Convention. My respect and admiration for both Maurice and Lani only grew, as Pam and I followed in their footsteps. He was a friend and a source of inspiration as I tried to fill the enormous shoes he left behind.

While reminiscing about Lion Maurice, I thought it would be a great time to recall some of the other Past International Directors from Hawaii. Since becoming its own single District in 1936, Hawaii has had ten (10) Directors serving on the International Board. Chronologically, based on their years of service:

And finally, yours truly who served as DG in 2018-19, and as International Director in 2022-24. Unfortunately, all the others have passed on.

PID Henry Nye

According to records, PID Henry Nye was a member of our mother club, the Lions Club of Honolulu. He was a leader in numerous civic and fraternal organizations, including the Boy

Scouts, St. Louis Alumni Association and the Order of Kamehameha. He served in the Territorial government as registrar of public accounts and then as deputy comptroller for the City until his death.

PID Oren Long

PID Oren Long was also a member of the Lions Club of Honolulu, and probably the most accomplished of all the past directors from Hawaii. He served as Territorial Governor of Hawaii from 1951-53, then served in the Territorial Senate from 1956-58. He was elected to the US Senate in 1959 and replaced by another Lion, Daniel Inouye in 1963, when he decided not to rerun.

PID Val Marciel

PID Val Marciel served as State Comptroller and as head of the State Department of Accounting and General Services in the mid 1960's. He was a member of the Koolaupoko Lions Club and then became charter president of the Pali Lions Club when it was formed in 1962.

PID Paul Fernandez

Of the Lions on the list, I was privileged to know the last six Directors starting with PID Paul Fernandez. I first met Lion Paul when I became a member of the Honolulu Chinatown Lions Club in 1990. Since his club, the Moanalua Lions Club, was in the same Zone as mine, we met often at Zone and inter-club functions. He owned a typewriter service and repair company and was President of the Kalihi Business Association. Lion Paul and his CIS Lion Pat, were humble, friendly and welcoming. He always had a story or joke to tell.

PID Shizuo Onishi

Next was PID Shizuo, who was inducted into the Leeward Oahu Lion Club in 1942 and later started and became a charter member of the Aiea Lions Club in 1951. I met Lion Shizuo only a few times, at the start of my Lions journey. He was instrumental in starting the Hawaii Lions Eye Foundation in 1960, which eventually became the Hawaii Lions Foundation many years later. Lion Shizuo retired from C&H Sugar to run for ID and after, served on the International Board again as an appointee for President Jim Fowler in 1982-83. Some of you may remember the pavilions that were built at the Aiea Bay State Park in honor of PID Shizuo, by the Lions.

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PID Kiyoshi Hiramatsu

PID Kiyoshi “K-Fat” Hiramatsu was a member of the East Manoa Lions Club, retired as a Honolulu police captain, then became a business development officer for a local bank. I met Lion K-Fat while I lived on the Big Island and as a member of the Kailua-Kona Lions Club in the mid 1980’s. We had gotten to be friends and whenever he came to Kona, we would often go golfing together with other Lions from the South Kona Aloha Lions Club.

PID Herbert Watanabe

PID Herbert was a Life Member of the Waiakea Lions Club, with 65 years of service. He was an educator with the State Department of Health, and was elected to the State Board of Education, serving as the Chairperson two terms. I got to know Lion Herb when I served as Zone Chair for DG Jimmy Low, who was also from the Waiakea Lions Club, in 1985-86. He could be stern and obstinate in those early days, but eventually mellowed out through the years. Our friendship grew when I became the Host Chair for the 2015 International Convention, and became a huge advocate and mentor as I decided to seek higher office.

PID Melvin Nakamura

Born in Kapaa, Kauai, PID Mel was a Chemical Engineer and retired from the Honolulu Gas Company as Vice President. He was a member of the Waioli Lions Club, which eventually merged into the Manoa Lions Club. I got to know Lion Mel when I became a Chinatown Lion, and he and PDG Merv Wee played a major role in the direction my Lions journey took me. They were directly responsible for me becoming an HLF Trustee, chairing the Eye Bank, and with a lot of arm-twisting, chairing the 2015 International Convention. Eventually, whenever I saw the two together, I would turn around and run away, not knowing what they had in store for me next. But they knew that their persistence and guidance would put me on my path, for which I am truly grateful.

PID Phil Sterker

Lastly, I also need to mention PID Phil Sterker, who served on the Board in 1971-73 from Multiple District 6 Colorado. He was a candidate for International President, and eventually retired to Kalaheo, Kauai in the late 1990’s. He had a great sense of humor and always had a story to tell. Lion Phil and his CIS Sandi became great friends, always happy to help and mentor when asked. He passed away in 2013 and Lion Sandi decided to return to Arizona a few years ago. We always look forward to seeing her at the Forums and Conventions.

I’m sure that some of my fellow Lions have their share of stories and fond memories of these Lions, which unfortunately are fading away due to the passage of time. As we start to celebrate a century of Lions service in Hawaii next year, it’s fitting to ponder on our history and those that came before us.

And one of the best ways to remember them is to nominate them for the District Hall of Fame. Let’s recognize and honor those special Lions who deserve to be inducted into the Hall. The application is available on both the [HLF](#) and [Hawaii Lions](#) websites.

Remembering Lion Maurice “Butch” Kahawaii — *Da Silva Fox, Da Bunny, Da Braddah*

I remember meeting Maurice “Butch” Kahawaii in the late 1970s, back when he was a truck driver for Chevron competing in a truck driving contest. Later, he became the neighbor islands terminal supervisor and eventually manager, overseeing the operations of the terminals on Kauai, Maui, and Hawaii Island. His interest in safe operations at Chevron led him to join the Big Island Fleet Safety Organization and the Hawaii Transportation Association, where I was also a member. Over the years, starting in the early 1980s, we got to know each other well.

Whenever I visited the Chevron terminal in Hilo, I noticed he always signed notes and memos with “MMK.” I asked what MMK meant. He said his middle name was Mitsuo—his father was Hawaiian and his mother Japanese. From that day on, I called him Mitsuo-san. I’d meet Mitsuo-san at least once a week for work-related occasions.

In 1987, after I became a Waiakea Lion, I discovered Mitsuo-san was already a Waiakea Lion, having joined a year before me. At that club meeting, he became Lion Maurice and I became Lion Wayne—so formal!

Believe it or not, Lion Maurice’s hair was brown back then. He was hardworking and a good sport, always willing to do crazy things to liven up the club. I remember challenging him over attendance at our general membership meetings. The loser had to get dumped into Ice Pond that evening. The tide was low, rocks were above the water level and it was getting dark. Our sponsor asked

the hotel manager if we could use the swimming pool instead. Long story short, I got tossed in the pool — then so did Lion Maurice, thanks to a few Lions.

At a District Convention at Turtle Bay in Kahuku, Lion Maurice, two other Lions, and I—all with last names starting with ‘K’—decided to skip an afternoon session to go golfing. I learned Maurice was from Kahuku and that former U.S. Senator Daniel Akaka had been one of his teachers. Still, for some reason, Maurice attended and graduated from Lahainaluna High School on Maui. Heavy rain soaked us on the course, and when we returned to the hotel drenched, Maurice joked to the PDGs that we had gone diving—he always had a great sense of humor.

At the 1998 District Convention’s Friday Fun Night, the Waiakea Lions Club formed the band “Da Kakaroaches” to play Beatles songs. Lion Maurice was our Ringo Starr, playing cardboard drums with three other Lions as John, Paul, and George on cardboard guitars. We even used mops as our long hair! At the end, we threw our cardboard instruments and wigs into the crowd. If you didn’t see it, you missed a classic moment—it may never have been recorded, but for those who were there, it remains one of the FUN and GREAT memories of the 1998 District 50 Convention.

Lion Maurice’s hair changed over time, from brown to blond and eventually silver. At his first District Convention with silver hair, he earned the nickname “Da Silva Fox.”

After retiring and moving to Kona, Da Silva Fox kept meeting up with the Waiakea Lions in Hilo until eventually joining the Lions Club of Kona.

Even after becoming homebound, I made a point to drive to Kona to visit him and reminisce about the good fun days and kolohe kine stuff together. There were several times I thought Da Silva Fox would leave us, but like the Energizer Bunny, he just kept going—for two and a half years, outliving the doctors' expectations. Our visits were always filled with laughter and sharing happy stories.

Rest in peace, Braddah Lion PID Maurice Butch Silva Fox Bunny Kahawaii.

By the way, MMK means Maurice Mo Kolohe!!

I told them, *"Take ten!"* The eldest auntie laughed and said, *"Boy, I like buy you a couple sodas."* I said, *"No need!"* We shared hugs instead. Then, as they walked away, the eldest auntie called out, *"By da way, boy, I left two bits each!"* — not realizing sodas weren't 25 cents anymore. It made me bust out laughing because it reminded me of my late *Tutu Man*. It was a total blessed moment. We're Lions. We serve.

One last question, what's your go-to comfort food after a long service project?

Before I even became a Lion, I learned that serving alongside Lions always meant that when the project was done, there'd be a free meal waiting. And it was *always* yummy!

SVDG Tony has been proudly serving as a Lion since 2017.

Every month, we'll spotlight two Lions — one a familiar face and leader in our organization, and one you might not have met yet. It's our way of celebrating the heart and spirit of our Lion 'ohana.

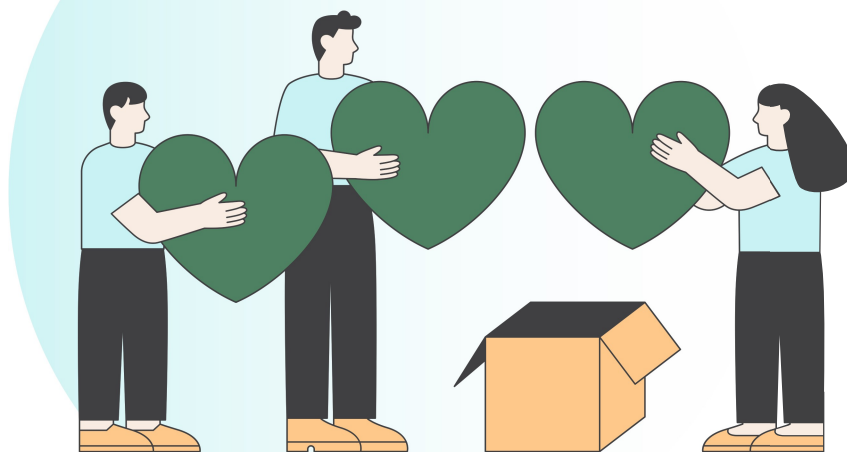

INITIAL FINDINGS

In our report for the first cabinet meeting, we listed some of our findings for the cabinet to review. Some of our findings that were presented were:

- To get Lions to step up to leadership positions.
- To have more mentoring for Lions.
- Negative politics have resulted in member conflict.
- PDGs should be more supportive than controlling.
- To have periodic audits and accountability of income and expenses.
- District needs to reach out to clubs that need help and show support.
- To investigate ways to reduce the high costs of participating in Lions events such as the Annual Convention and the KMS Winter Forum.

INSIGHTS GATHERED SINCE THE FIRST CABINET MEETING

Since the first cabinet meeting, Da MDFF Ohanahood has reached out to other Lions to share their thoughts, words of wisdom and suggestions:

- Besides having Lions active in their local club, we need to get them active in zone, region, and district activities to have them better understand what it really means for them to be a part of our GREAT 'OHANA.
- Have D50 and HLF more involved with clubs to provide more and better resources to the clubs so the clubs can better serve their members and communities.
- Take a serious look into lowering the costs to participate in the Annual Convention, the KMC Winter Forum and other programs such as cheaper alternatives (hotel, off property meals and functions, and solicitation of sponsors).
- Have new Lions enjoy the reason that they became a Lion before taking on leadership positions.
- Participate in community service and special projects to enjoy the fellowship and to feel good serving the less fortunate in our communities.
- Develop an action plan to identify your interest in serving and how much time and effort you can dedicate.
- Determine what you can do to help or lead.
- Realize that you may not be able to participate in every meeting, project or event, but to do your best to keep as actively involved as possible.
- We (D50 and HLF) need to develop an action plan with SMART goals, review the plan and goals periodically, and make necessary adjustments as we go along our path to success.
- When dealing with politics, determine if it is a form of negativity. If it is a form of negativity, identify the negativity and think of ideas of turning it into POSITIVITY!!
- Talk stories to change our future. Our stories should be of successes instead of being hurtful. Many times, hurtful stories are just rumors and spreading rumors can work against you. FORGIVE, APPRECIATE and SHARE the GOOD STORIES!!!
- Always be TRUE to yourself and be TRUE to others.
- Surround yourself with good people who like to do good things for good causes and give others an opportunity to contribute.

The Lions Eye Bank of Hawaii is now officially operational! Referrals are linked to the EMR system, donor screening and reviews are ongoing, and preparations are underway for an FDA inspection. Support continues from Legacy of Life Hawaii and the San Diego Eye Bank. Expansion to Hilo is planned once staffing is complete on O'ahu.

Welcoming New Citizens on Constitution Day

The Hawaii Lions Citizenship & Naturalization Committee assisted with the US Citizenship & Immigration Services (USCIS) during the Honolulu Field Office's Special Naturalization Ceremony on Constitution Day, September 17, 2025 at Punahou School Dillingham Auditorium.

The Citizenship Ceremony started promptly at 10:30 a.m. with opening remarks by USCIS Field Office Director Jayci Roney introducing the "Faces of the Nation" video and US District Court Chief Judge Derrick K. Watson who presided over the Oath of Allegiance.

Director Roney petitioned the court for the Naturalization of 68 candidates and 32 petitions for name changes. The roll call of 21 countries represented included members from Brazil, China, Ethiopia, Hong Kong, Jamaica, Japan, Kenya, Laos, Nepal, The Netherlands, New Zealand, Nigeria, Philippines, Portugal, Samoa, South Korea, Taiwan, Thailand, Turkey, United Kingdom, and Vietnam.

After the honorees recited the Oath of Allegiance and were declared new United States citizens, they were greeted by a video

message from President Trump congratulating the new citizens. Chief Judge Watson reminded the 68 new citizens of all the great benefits they have finally earned, the right to vote; access to Federal jobs; run for political office; participating in court as a juror, etc. All have studied hard; read and taken tests, but the best benefit is the responsibility to "always help those in need."

Mr. Yunus Peer, History & World Civilizations Teacher at Punahou, who was a political exile from South Africa in 1976; was the honored guest who presented the naturalization certificates. He acknowledged the long road and the hard work it has taken to become a United States citizen. He expressed that "Home is where you're meant to be. May you always feel at home here".

The Punahou 5th grade class led the audience in the Pledge of Allegiance followed by a video presentation of "America the Beautiful." The entire ceremony was a first class event with support from the US Pacific Fleet Brass Quintet, the Punahou JROTC Color Guard, and the Punahou Chorale.

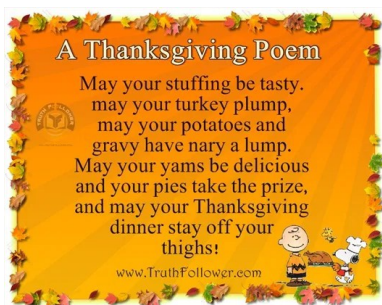
