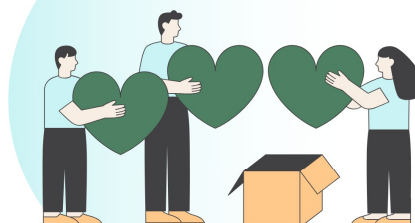

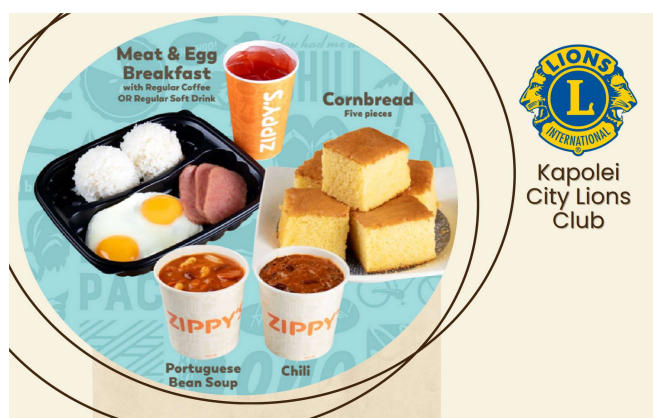

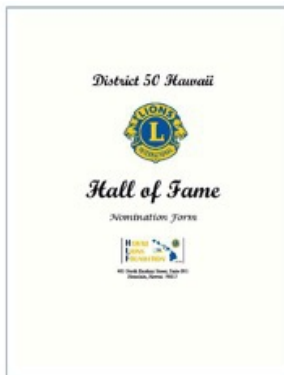
A Holiday Cornucopia

As we near the end of another year, Lion Pam and I would like to take this opportunity to wish you the very best of the holidays. And as you gather with family and friends to reflect on the year just past, also ponder the impact that you've had as a Lion, both locally and globally. Think about the lives you've aided or saved with your service and membership as a Lion, and through your support of the Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF) and the Hawaii Lions Foundation (HLF).

Since July, we've already served and helped 119 million people, volunteered over 22 million service hours, while performing over 610,000 projects and activities around the world. Consider that this is with only 50% of the clubs reporting, so our true impact is so much more! ROAR! Be proud to be a Lion! You truly make a difference in someone's life.

Centennial Aloha Shirts Mahalo to all of you who purchased a shirt or two. We received enough orders to meet the minimums required to have the shirts manufactured, so a loan from the District's reserve fund wasn't needed. We've placed the order and hope to have them in time for the District Convention in Hilo. We'll keep you informed as we hear more from Reyn Spooner during the fabrication. It's a go!



District Hall of Fame As I've written several times before, the Hawaii Lions Foundation (HLF) has taken over the District 50 Hawaii Lions Hall of Fame (HoF). Alongside the HLF Fellowships, the HoF will recognize and honor those Lions who have had a profound and lasting impact on our District. Consideration has also been made for those Lions long after their active years of service or after their deaths, with a historic or posthumous nomination.

If you or your club have a worthy candidate, please help us identify those deserving Lions by nominating them. The application forms are available online at both the Hawaii Lions Foundation and Hawaii Lions websites. We would like to induct the inaugural class of honorees during the District Convention in Hilo. Thus the nominations must be received by HLF no later than January 22, 2026 for consideration. Please contact me if you have questions on the HoF.

Protocol Protocol is defined as respect for a position and a form of etiquette. I've attended enough events to know that some Lions still struggle with the order of precedence, or even question the need for protocol within our organization, especially our newer members. For me, protocol is respect, not for the position, but for the individual who accepts the duties and responsibilities, and the hardships imposed by that position. Many Lions don't understand and comprehend the demands and expectations made of our leaders, especially our executive and international directors. Remember, we're all volunteers.

Our International President, Immediate Past President, Vice Presidents and their spouses spend over 300 days a year on the road. Think about that, away from home 11 months of the year, living

out of a suitcase. Imagine the long hours spent in airports and through security, catching over 150 flights a year to points all over the world. The endless meetings, speeches and meals that you're required to attend and participate in, while being on call 24/7.

Life as an International Director is certainly a lot easier, traveling only about half the year. Still, consider the countless hours spent at airports and in the air, also living out of suitcases at points unknown. Believe me, there's nothing glamorous about the meetings, speeches and meals, as one visit blurs into another. The expectations and demands on time, talent and treasure to serve at the highest levels can be demanding.

Thus, when a Lion questions the need for protocol. I question how much that individual truly knows about the onus we place on our officers to lead our Association. For me, protocol is more than etiquette, it's an understanding of the sacrifices made to serve our Association, the respect truly earned.

I ask you to consider this especially during our District Conventions, as Past International President Brian & Lori Sheehan will be our guests in Hilo this coming April, and then sitting International President Mark & Lyn Lyon will be our guests in 2027. And yes, we have a great guest lined up for Hilo in April of 2028. If you have questions on protocol, a lot of great information is readily available on the LCI website, or feel free to contact me.



The following is the official protocol policy of The International Association of Lions Clubs. The purpose of protocol is to recognize the order of precedence of Lions leadership. Only the principal speaker is required to acknowledge all dignitaries present.

A. Order of Precedence

9. GAT/LCIF Constitutional Area Leader (a)
10. LCIF Vice Constitutional Area Leader
11. GAT/LCIF Area Leaders (a)
12. Chairperson, Council of Governors (a)
13. District Governors
14. Coordinating Lion
15. International Administrative Officers
16. Multiple District GMT/GET/GLT/GST and LCIF Coordinators
17. Immediate Past District Governor (a)
18. Vice District Governors (according to rank)
19. Multiple District Committee Chairpersons (a)

JANUARY WEEK OF SERVICE

What is Weeks of Service?

Lions Club International (LCI) mobilizes Lions and Leos worldwide to take action on three urgent global challenges—**mental health and well-being, hunger, and the environment**. Each issue is spotlighted for one dedicated week, empowering clubs to lead impactful service projects and raise awareness in their communities.

What is planned for January?

LCI urges you to mark your calendars for **Hunger week set for January 3-11, 2026**. Clubs are encouraged to conduct a project related to Hunger during the week of service dates of January 3 – January 11, 2026. In addition, we encourage every club to participate in the Lions in Sight 2026 Recycled Eyeglasses & District 50 Statewide Food Drive on January 24, 2026. (Please see the flyer in this issue for details.)

Hunger related project ideas

Support Kūpuna: Organize a food distribution or pantry restock for seniors or populations at risk in the community. Consider places like community centers or senior centers.

Help Keiki in Schools: Provide healthy snacks or meal support for students. Tailor the type of food and how it's shared to fit local needs.

Community Garden Service: Volunteer at or partner with a local garden to grow and share produce. Focus on harvesting, planting, education, or consider supporting a nearby farm or taro patch.

Meals for the Houseless: Prepare and distribute simple, filling meals to houseless individuals. The menu and outreach approach can reflect each club's capacity and creativity.

Local Food Drive: Set up donation bins or collection points for staple foods. Choose locations and items most relevant to the community.

Cooking & Nutrition Outreach: Host a short demo or workshop on affordable, healthy meals. Adapt recipes and messaging to match their audience.

Financial Contribution: Consider contributing financially to a trustworthy organization helping with hunger needs in the community.

One requirement of the Club Excellence Award is to implement and report participation in each of LCI's three Weeks of Service. For Hunger Week, projects must take place during January 3–11, 2026 with a 10-day grace period before January 3 and after January 11. All projects must be documented in the Lions Portal to qualify. 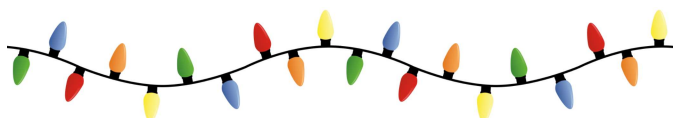

District 50’s monthly Best Practices Meeting held in November, centered on “Masters of Marketing,” spotlighting two standout clubs—**Kaua’i Lions Club** and **Ewa Beach Lions Club**—that are setting the standard for modern, community-focused outreach.

This session was described as one of the most powerful and inspiring Best Practices meetings yet, thanks to the genuine insights and energy shared by President Debra Thompson and Vice President & Zone Chair Lola Tripp.

Kaua’i Lions: A Model of Modern, Responsive Leadership



Disco Fundraiser

President Debra Thompson showcased the **Kaua’i Lions’** successful Disco Fundraiser, which replaced their long-running Blind Dining event and drew significant community interest.

Event Outcomes:

- Attendance: 160–170 people
- Pre-Sale Tickets: 70
- Non-Lions Attendees: ~80%
- Total Revenue: \$6,900
- Expenses: \$1,910
- Net Profit: \$4,990
- Ticket Price: \$40, alcohol-free

Beneath the numbers, **Kaua’i Lions** shared something deeper: an intentional commitment to evolve with their community.

A Commitment Made 10 Years Ago

President Debra shared that when the club chartered 10 years ago, they made a promise to stay responsive to the changing needs of their members and their island community.

That forward-thinking mindset is why they:

- Accept Venmo and digital payments
- Use social media and group texts
- Delegate digital tasks to younger members and helpers
- Embrace change, trends, and new ways of connecting with people

This is not just marketing — it’s a philosophy of leadership.

Kaua’i Lions’ Marketing Techniques

1. Strategic and Consistent Social Media Posting
 - The club posted flyers, teaser videos, and day-of photos to build excitement and visibility.
2. High-Quality Content Creation
 - Disco Chair Lion Melanee designed the official flyer and tickets

- President Debra's kids took photos and video footage at the event, then turned it into polished social media content
 - The combination gave their event a fresh, modern, and professional look.
3. QR Code Ticketing & Digital Payments
 - Easy, mobile-friendly ticketing appealed to younger adults and boosted pre-sales.
 4. Real-Time Posting During the Event
 - Live photos and videos helped expand reach and created instant buzz.

Why it works:

Kaua'i Lions look like a club that understands today's audience — active, relevant, and welcoming.

Ewa Beach Lions: A Visibility Powerhouse With Passionate Leadership

Vice President & Zone Chair Lola Tripp shared the **Ewa Beach Lions'** dynamic approach to marketing, built on creativity, consistency, and an unstoppable "can-do" attitude.

Club Activity Highlights

- 36-unit Christmas Parade
- Krispy Kreme fundraiser bringing in \$1,300–\$1,400 per event
- Annual Free Valentine's Dance for seniors
- Strong partnerships with local businesses
- Outreach through Facebook, Instagram, banners, QR codes, and flyers

Their **Ewa Beach Lions Foundation** continues to support donations, sponsorships, and large-scale event planning.

Lola's Inspiring Style

Attendees described Lion Lola as:

- Passionate
- Energizing
- Encouraging
- Resourceful
- A natural motivator

Many remarked, "We need to get her in front of more clubs." Her enthusiasm and leadership represent the next wave of D50 Lions.

Ewa Beach's Marketing Techniques

1. Members Sharing Events on Personal Accounts
 - This multiplies reach and helps the club tap into younger demographics.
2. High-Visibility Street Banners
 - Perfect for reaching kupuna, families, and non-social-media users.
3. QR Codes on All Flyers
 - Instant access encourages immediate sign-ups and interest.
4. Flyers in Local Businesses
 - Longs Drugs, community stores, and neighborhood hubs help spread the word.
5. Events That Create Their Own Buzz
 - Parades, dances, and service projects generate photos, shares, and community talk.
6. Foundation Structure
 - Helps secure donations, sponsorships, and smoother outreach.

Navigate the Lion Portal with Confidence

The Lion Portal was rolled out in April 2023 and continues to improve with ongoing updates. In many ways inputting as well as extracting data has become easier with more data available to the individual, club, and district officers. Data access by all is limited to personal data of a Lion or Leo. Extra access is available to club or district to Lion or Leo officers. There is a “need to know” access based on the Lion or Leo assignment for access to the information.

Registering for the Lion Portal

Before anyone can access the Lion Portal they have to register for access. This process is easy and can be done in just a few minutes. To register, you must:

- Be a member whose information is already posted in the portal as a Lion or Leo.
- Use the email already posted in the portal - if you are unsure, contact your club secretary, president, or administrator for assistance.
- Your email in the portal must be unique, which means you are the only one using that email in the Lion Portal.
- Have a current phone number listed.

Once Registered

Log in and access features which can be of benefit to you as a Lion or Leo:

- “Membership Information”
- “Service Activity” posting
- “Learn” training classes which are short and accessible to Lions and Leos

I encourage you to log in and explore the various pages. The easiest way to understand your access is simply to look around the site—if something isn’t available to you, the system will let you know. Take some time to practice navigating and get comfortable with the layout.

NOAA 2025–2026 Wet Season Weather Outlook (October 2025–April 2026)

Overview

- A **weak La Niña** is underway and expected to last through early 2026, shifting to **neutral conditions by March**.
- The upcoming **wet season** will likely bring **above-normal rainfall**, especially across **O‘ahu and Kaua‘i**, through early spring.
- **Temperatures** are forecast to remain **above normal statewide**.

Dry Season Recap (May–Sept 2025)

- The 2025 dry season ranked as **the 3rd driest in 30 years**.
- Drought persisted across about **70% of the state**, worsening on **O‘ahu’s windward and leeward coasts** and **Hāmākua/Ka‘ū (Big Island)**.

Wet Season Implications

- If rainfall patterns hold, **drought conditions are expected to improve or end** in most areas by April 2026.
- Expect **periods of heavy rain**, localized **floodings**, and **occasional thunderstorms**, especially during January–March 2026.

Preparedness Recommendations for Hotel & Security Teams

1. Flood Awareness:

- Inspect and clear storm drains and catch basins around the property.
- Keep sandbags or barriers ready for vulnerable areas (garages, loading docks, pool pump rooms).

2. Safety Precautions:

- Avoid driving or walking through floodwaters; brief staff on safe response procedures.
- Ensure backup lighting and power systems are maintained and tested.

3. Guest Communication:

- Expect slower traffic and possible road closures during heavy rain events.
- Remind guests to avoid hiking or outdoor activities near streams or ridgelines during storms.

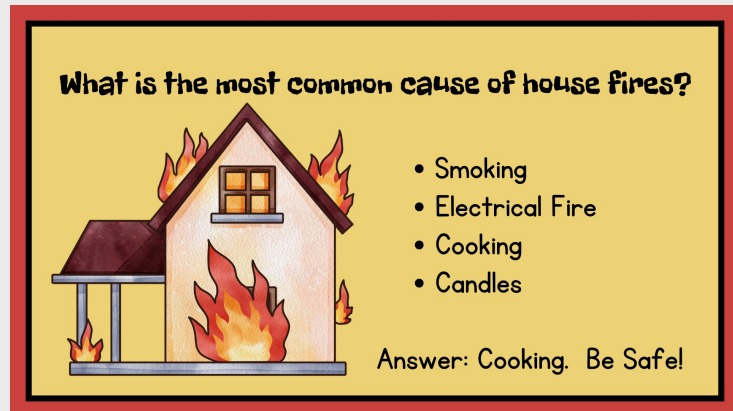

Safety



Decorating homes and businesses is a long-standing tradition around the holiday season. Unfortunately, these same decorations may increase your community's chances of a fire.

Did you know:

Almost one-third of home Christmas tree fires are caused by electrical problems.

Source: National Fire Protection Association

- Keep candles at least 12 inches away from anything that burns. Make sure they are in stable holders and place them where they cannot be knocked down easily.
- Consider using battery-operated flameless candles, which can look, smell and feel like real candles.
- Inspect holiday lights each year before you put them up. Throw away light strands with frayed or pinched wires.
- Read manufacturer's instructions for the number of light strands to connect.
- Water your Christmas tree every day. A dry Christmas tree can burn very hot and very fast.
- Make sure your tree is at least 3 feet away from heat sources like fireplaces, radiators, space heaters, candles or heat vents. Also, make sure your tree does not block exits.
- Get rid of your tree after Christmas or when it is dry.

The Move to Pu'uhonua o Wai'anae Mauka

On October 19th, I escorted Lion Jaci Yokogawa (**Koko Head**) and Lion Henry Acosta (**Honolulu Roosevelt Lions Club**) as well as three people from Purple Maia to the Wai'anae Boat Harbor to help clean up the encampment in preparation of clearing out the Boat Harbor as they move up to Pu'uhonua O Wai'anae Mauka village.



Together we cleared one of the camps formerly occupied by Jacleen, who was in [my short 360 documentary](#).

The 20 acre Wai'anae property was purchased with \$1.2 million in donations and working with the state, they were able to tie in sewer, water, and electricity to give what will be over 250 houseless individuals a place to call home. As of October, they had 60 homes built with several more in various phases of construction and one out of 7 community facilities (kitchen, bathrooms and showers, and laundry) being prepared.

They must be moved out of the boat harbor by the end of November.

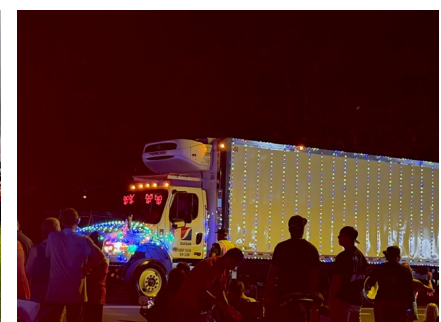
