At the same time, I believed strongly in using technology to help unite our district. Because we are separated by islands, all of our cabinet meetings were held in a hybrid Zoom format so members throughout Hawai’i could stay connected, informed, and involved.

With support from the Hawai'i Lions Foundation and Lions Clubs International Foundation, Lions came together to help families with storm recovery and home repairs.

EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS

June will mark the start of Hurricane Season in Hawaii. I have not confirmed this, but this year, the National Weather Service has stated that there may be an increase in hurricanes in the Pacific due to El Niño.

Look at the damage and chaos the last couple of months of weather caused. With that being said, **are you prepared?** If not, I have included a 14-day emergency kit to help guide you on what you will need. I have also included a guide to help with debris removal should a major event (hurricane or tsunami) occur.



There will be a CERT (Community Emergency Response Team) course conducted on Sundays in July in Honolulu. If you are interested in enrolling in this course, please contact me. This course will teach you how to safely extinguish a live fire, but it will also teach you about disasters, how to prepare and respond safely after the disaster, triage, medical treatment, and other educational knowledge to give you and your loved ones the best chance of survival. Should you complete this course, I will give you the Lions Alert backpack, helmet, and vest.

14-DAY DISASTER SUPPLY KIT

What is a 14-DAY DISASTER SUPPLY KIT?

Living on an island means that it is extremely important to have a 14-day disaster supply kit. Unlike areas in the continental US, Hawaii residents don't have the option to drive somewhere that hasn't been impacted when a hurricane happens. We must be ready with food, water, and emergency supplies in case goods cannot be offloaded from ships, transportation on island is not available, or utilities are out.

Your 14-day disaster supply kit should include everything your household would need to survive for two weeks without utilities or access to outside supplies.

14-Day Kit Tips

- Building a 14-day supply can be costly for some families. Start small and grow your kit as you are able.
- Check the expiration dates on your supplies.
- Test your devices periodically.
- Keep a small amount of water on hand. Pack water containers that you can fill just-in-time for the rest of your household's water needs.
- Talk with your household to make sure everyone's needs are met with your 14-day kit.

Where should I keep my 14-Day Kit?

You may need to evacuate with your kit depending on where you live. Most of this kit should be packed ahead of time. You can add more items as needed just-in-time.

Your 14-day kit may be very large/bulky. Some ideas of where to store it:

- In a closet
- Under the bed
- In the garage

Evacuation Go Bag

Some emergencies can occur without notice and there may not be enough time to take your entire 14-day kit with you. It is important to pack a Go Bag of essential supplies from your 14-day kit that you can grab and go quickly if you need to.

What do I need in my 14-DAY KIT?

Make sure your 14-day kit includes enough supplies for each member of your household.

Emergency Plan and Contacts	IDs and Important Documents	Phone Charger and Backup Battery
Water 1 Gallon per Person per Day	Non-perishable Food and Can Opener	Radio (Hand-crank or with extra batteries)
First Aid	Personal Care and Sanitation Items	Medications and Glasses
Whistle	Waterproof Flashlight and Extra Batteries	Extra Cash (Small bills)
Sturdy Shoes and Socks	Mask (Dist. multi-grade or particle)	Pocket Knife and/or Tools
Work Gloves	Clothing and Extra Undergarments	Comfort or Entertainment Items

Your family may have unique needs, make sure to consider those in your planning. This will be different for every household. Some examples are extra batteries for medical devices, pet food, or items for keiki or kupuna.

Debris Removal Guidelines for Private Residential Properties

In efforts to expedite the debris removal process, please follow these rules.

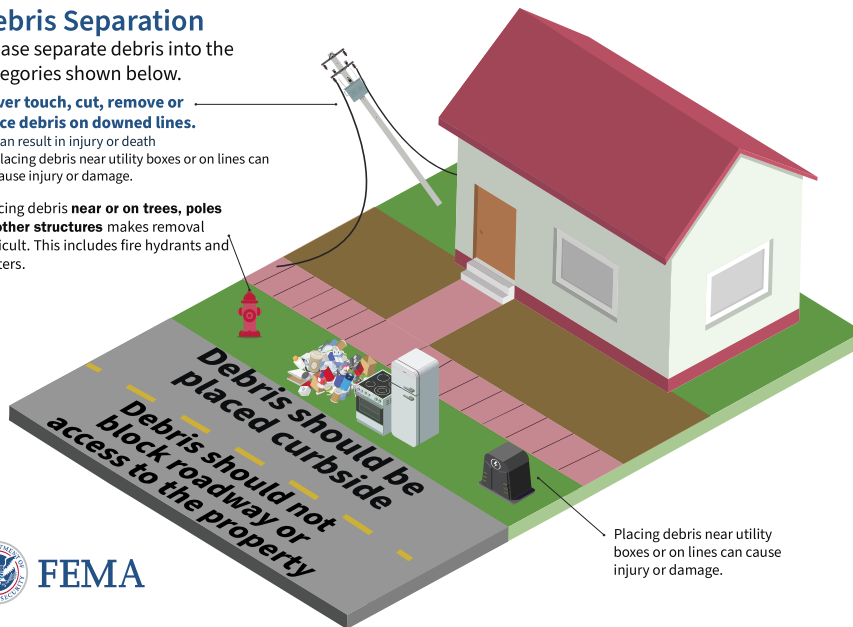
Debris Separation

Please separate debris into the categories shown below.

Never touch, cut, remove or place debris on downed lines.

- Can result in injury or death
- Placing debris near utility boxes or on lines can cause injury or damage.

Placing debris **near or on trees, poles or other structures** makes removal difficult. This includes fire hydrants and meters.



Check with your local office of emergency management for more information on debris removal.



Large Appliances
Refrigerator, washer/dryer, air conditioner, stove, water heater, dishwasher. Do not leave doors unsealed or unsecured.



Construction Debris
Building materials, drywall, lumber, carpet, furniture, plumbing.



Vegetative Debris
Tree branches, leaves, logs, plants.



Hazardous Waste
Oil, battery, pesticide, paint, cleaning supplies,



Electronics
Television, computer, stereo, phone, DVD player.

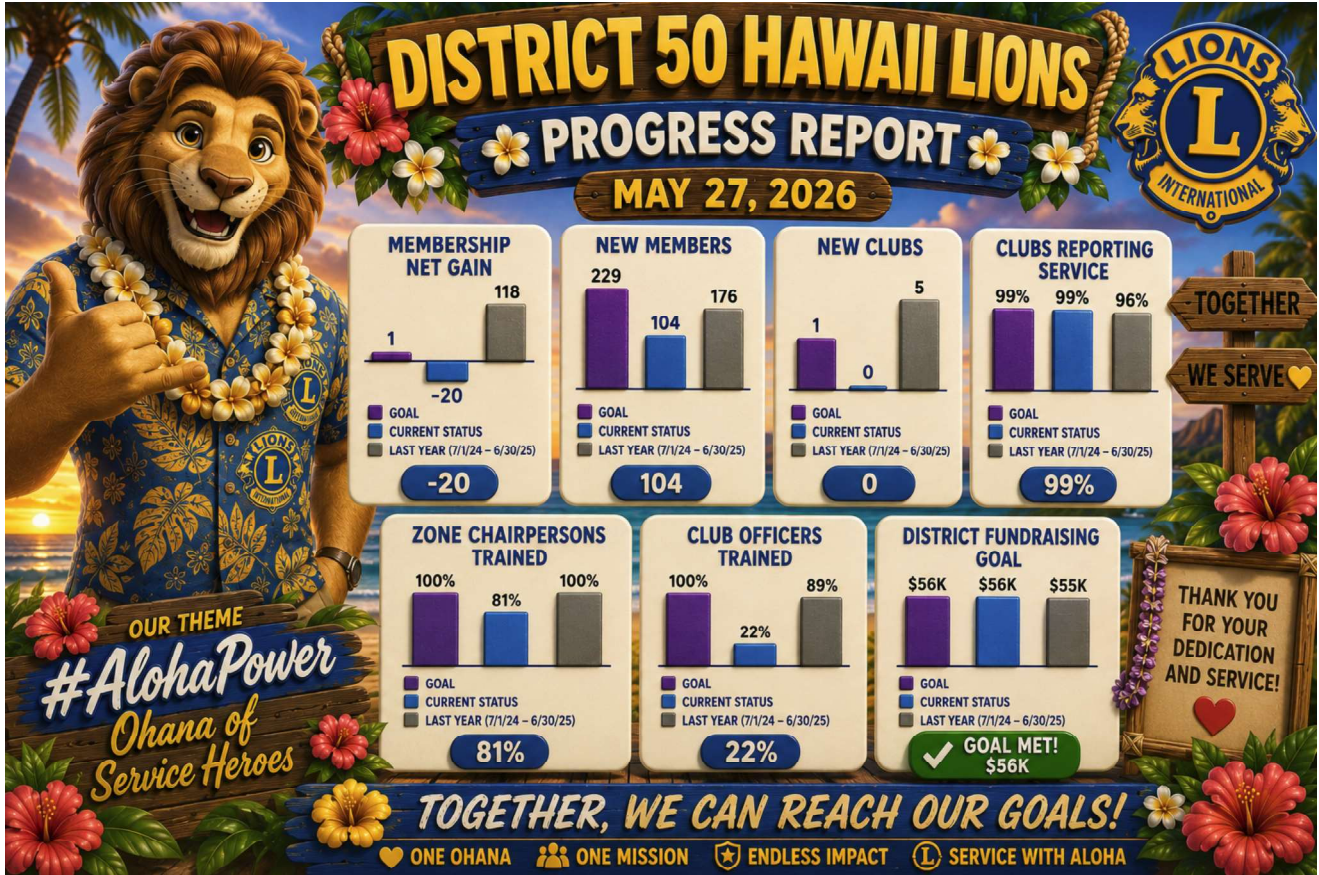

Talking Story with DG Bruddah Sean

DG Bruddah Sean and I spent many hours talking story this past year. My caregiving responsibilities have limited my ability to attend events in person, so I've always appreciated his regular check-ins. As his year as District Governor comes to a close, we spent some time talking story about one of this year's most inspiring successes, the revitalization of the Moloka'i Lions Club.

RA: When I think about your year, I keep coming back to the Moloka'i story. It feels like so much of what you've been working toward came together all at once.

DG Bruddah Sean: It kind of did! The funny thing is, this story really started years ago. Back in 2022, I saw that the **Moloka'i Lions Club** was struggling and knew that eventually we needed to help bring new life to the club. It stayed in the back of my mind for years.

RA: Many Lions played important roles in the Moloka'i story.

DG Bruddah Sean: This story really belongs to a lot of people. It started with Lion Cathy Callejo of the **Manoa Lions** who learned through her church and community connections that Moloka'i needed assistance after the Kona Low storms. She reached out and connected us with the community and the opportunity to meet prospective Lions. Without her efforts, none of this would have happened.

PDG Mark and Lion Eloisa Mizuno immediately stepped forward to help. As the Guiding Lion for the **Moloka'i Lions Club**, PDG Mark provided valuable leadership and encouragement throughout the process. Together, they traveled to Moloka'i with me, built community relationships, and supported the vision of revitalizing Lionism on the island. Lion Eloisa's family ties to Moloka'i also provided important insight into the community and its needs.

The Baumans have been the heart of the **Moloka'i Lions Club** for many years. Through all the ups and downs, they never gave up hope that Lionism on Moloka'i would grow strong again. I also want to recognize Lion Julia Peterson, the **Moloka'i Leo** Advisor. It was especially meaningful to see her officially inducted as a Lion as part of the celebration.

No reflection on this year would be complete without recognizing Lion Pam Young, our District 50 Photographer. Lion Pam has generously traveled across Hawai'i at her own expense to document projects, activities, and events throughout the district. Through her photos, she captures the people, friendships, and service that make Lionism so special. Because of her dedication, Lions across our islands have been able to share in each other's successes and stay connected to the great work being done throughout District 50. I am incredibly grateful for the countless hours she has devoted to our Lions 'ohana.

RA: What lesson does this teach Lions everywhere?

DG Bruddah Sean: That one person, or one family, can make a tremendous difference. Lion Cathy made the call. PDG Mark and Lion Eloisa helped build the relationships. The Baumans preserved the club through difficult years. And now new members Lions Kilia and Justin have

stepped forward to lead them into the next chapter. When people ask me how the Moloka'i story happened, I tell them it wasn't one person. It was Lions working together across generations, islands, and communities.

RA: Why is the Moloka'i story so meaningful to you?

DG Bruddah Sean: Because it represents everything I've been trying to accomplish. We inducted new members, connected with existing Lions, strengthened relationships, and created opportunities for future growth.

The best part is that the story doesn't end there. Lion Kilia is a school counselor at a charter school and already wants to start a Leo Club. These new Lions are bringing in other young families and creating momentum for the future. That's exactly what Lionism needs.

RA: You spent a lot of your year talking about Leos and investing in young people. How does this story fit into that?

DG Bruddah Sean: It's everything. The future of Lions depends on our young people. Just take a look at the **Kona Healthy Leo Lion Club!** If we want our clubs to thrive, we need to engage youth, support Leos, and help them become leaders. What's exciting about Moloka'i is that the Leos may actually help sustain and grow Lionism on Moloka'i. Usually we think of Lions supporting Leos, but this is a great example of young people helping strengthen the future of Lions.

RA: Looking back, what are you most proud of from your year?

DG Bruddah Sean: Two things. First, seeing our Leos grow and serve. One of my proudest moments was watching Leo members volunteer at a Christmas event for over 200 homeless families. These young people could have been spending their weekend anywhere else, but they chose service.

Second, the **Moloka'i Lions** story. A lot of people had been trying to support and reconnect with Moloka'i for years. I was fortunate to work alongside some amazing Lions, and seeing all those efforts finally come together was incredibly rewarding.

RA: If there was one thing you'd like Lions to remember from your year, what would it be?

DG Bruddah Sean: One year isn't enough time to finish everything. But one year is enough time to start something. My hope is that we've created momentum. If we keep working together, supporting our communities, investing in our youth, and building relationships, the best is still ahead of us.

We are stronger when we work together. Whether you're a Lion, Leo, community partner, or supporter, every person can make a difference. The Moloka'i story shows what happens when people come together around a shared vision. It wasn't one person, it was many people working together.

LIONS EYE BANK OF HAWAII

The Lions Eye Bank of Hawaii will be managed and operated by the San Diego Eye Bank, under a Memorandum between Hawaii Lions Foundation, the San Diego Eye Bank, and the Legacy of Life. The following is the update from San Diego Eye Bank:

CALL CENTER & STAFFING

The call center is ready to intake referrals from all Hawaii hospitals. All hospitals are now open for referrals and procurement. We have added two staff members to handle incoming LEBH calls. Per diem staff are also supporting call center screening and chart reviews. We are in the process of adding more per diems to reach a total of six.

EMR ACCESS

We are working on online EMR access for Queen's Medical Center and Kaiser, with Legacy of Life Hawaii also assisting in securing that access. Hilo online EMR access is also in progress. Once those are in place, we will open Hilo operations, activate the storage lab, and establish a training program on the Big Island.

MEDICAL DIRECTOR

We have re-engaged Dr. Daniel Choi, MD, our Medical Director, to support our paperwork submissions within the Queen's Health System. We will also be enlisting him for chart review as needed.

DISTRIBUTION & LOGISTICS

Distribution and logistics for LEBH are in place and operational.

PROCUREMENT

Procurement is ongoing and progressing well.

FULL-TIME STAFF

We are on track to have a full-time LEBH staff member in place by July 2026.

GRAND OPENING

We are planning an LEBH Grand Opening Ceremony, tentatively in August 2026.

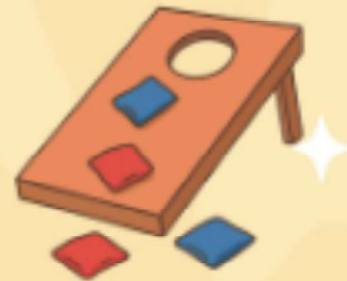

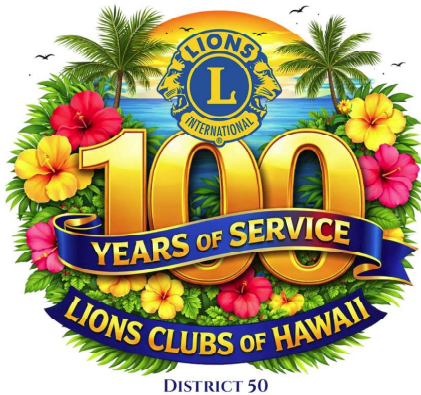

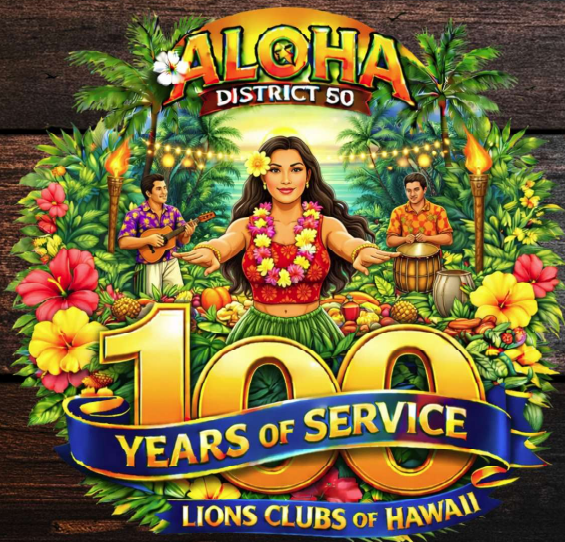
